Dear Journey's School Parents:

Greetings from Coyote Canyon! Summer is nearing the end and Journey's School is ramping up for an incredible 11th year. I have spent the summer reflecting on the years past and the years to come. Most poignant, I read a history about a school much like Journey's School, but thirty years older. The veteran (and original) head of school, when asked what to look for in a school, simply stated, "Do the faculty and staff love children?" Underlying the topics of excellence, innovation, and student engagement, this reminded me that every decision should be based on what is best for children. I have often said that I work at schools because I want to change the world. A daunting task, no doubt, but without the children at the forefront, this end goal is impossible.

The campus has been very active with Teton Science Schools' summer education programs. New faculty begin training today and all faculty return this coming Monday to plan for the 2011-12 academic year. We have a big year coming up as we evaluate, practice and refine all of our programs as part of a larger Curriculum Project and Strategic Plan. Some highlights include:

1. Revise our elementary school math program to include the Singapore Approach model.
2. Complete authorization for the International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program.
3. Graduate our first International Baccalaureate diploma candidates.
4. Begin implementation of our strategic plan (adopted this summer).
5. Complete alignment analysis and documentation of our entire program as part of a curriculum mapping project.

Many faculty have worked on curriculum design over the summer and are eager to start the year. To help the faculty implement the changes in both the Curriculum Project and the Strategic Plan, we are working with a variety of outside providers throughout the year, including:

1. Association for Supervision and Curriculum Design (ASCD)
2. Harcourt Math professional development training
3. Curriculum mapping training
4. Phi Delta Kappa International
5. International Baccalaureate

All of this energy reinforces our four programmatic pillars of academic excellence, extraordinary relationships, place-based education, and global citizenship. Most importantly, our faculty are more engaged than ever to create an extraordinary place of learning for your children.

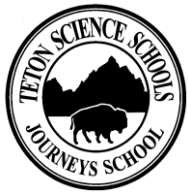

Middle School Student Supply List, 2011-2012

Welcome to Journey's School! As you know, or will quickly learn, our classroom extends beyond the walls of our building. We will spend time outside and in the community, so each student must come to school prepared to be in the field as well as for classroom learning. We will make every effort to notify you in advance of planned outdoor days. We have compiled this list so you can be well-prepared for the first day of school and the rest of the year. The outdoor gear you already use for recreation will be appropriate for school. For extended journeys, we will send home equipment lists. Returning parents might notice a few changes from last year's list. These changes reflect new plans and initiatives, such as improving and standardizing organizational systems, note-taking and journaling in math, and creating writing portfolios. If you have any questions, please call or email your student's advisor.

Required School Supplies: the following supplies are absolutely necessary for you to have when you begin the year at Journey's School.

- ___ Laptop computer with Microsoft Office & internet capacity
- ___ Comfortable indoor shoes with soles
- ___ Durable accordion folder with at least 5 pockets
- ___ 1 composition lab notebook (this is a hardcover journal-style notebook with grid paper)
- ___ 6 composition notebooks (these are the hardcover notebooks)
- ___ Loose leaf notebook paper (wide rule or college rule, student's choice, keep in accordion folder)
- ___ Graph paper (4 or 5 squares per inch, keep in accordion folder)
- ___ Student planner (for recording assignments)
- ___ Pencils, no. 2 or .07 mm mechanical, pencil bag/box to hold supplies
- ___ Highlighter pen
- ___ 6 glue sticks
- ___ Math 2 and Math 3 students (generally 7th and 8th grade): Graphing calculator manufactured by *Texas Instruments*: **TI 83 or TI 83 Plus** + spare 4 pack AAA batteries (in class demonstrations will use the **TI 83 Plus**)
- ___ Math 1 students (generally 6th grade): Simple calculator for computations (Math 1 students may purchase a graphing calculator, but its special features are not needed for the class)
- ___ Ruler with centimeters and inches
- ___ Protractor
- ___ Geometry compass
- ___ 1 liter water bottle marked with student's name
- ___ 1 day pack for gear and school supplies



Optional School Supplies

- ___ One or two dry, microwavable meal(s) (for that day you forget your lunch!)
- ___ Large eraser
- ___ Colored pencils, crayons or markers
- ___ 3-hole punch (light duty, fits in a notebook)
- ___ Small pencil sharpener
- ___ **1** 1.5-inch or 2-inch three-ring binder

Required Outdoor Gear: we will notify parents and students of outdoor journeys and activities in advance. With this in mind, *students should always come to school prepared to be outside*. This requires the following items:

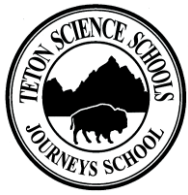
- ___ Sturdy hiking shoes/boots

Logistics

On each extended journey,* students should plan on arriving at school as normal. Students will need to bring a non-microwaveable, field lunch. All other meals will be provided. On the last day of the journey, we will return in time for the afternoon bus and pick-up.* Approximately 2 weeks before each extended journey, a letter including emergency contact information, a packing list, and schedule with specific activities and programs will be sent home with each student and emailed to parents.

Dear Parents,

This fall, the middle school will go on an extended journey to Dubois, WY. The dates of the journey are Wednesday, September 7 through Friday, September 9. The journey will support this year's theme, "World Cultures" and specifically the fall strand of "Ancient Cultures," as students will explore the Sheepeaters and Tie Hacks who lived in this area, as well as learn early math systems, and be introduced to astronomy. Below are several learning objectives for this first extended journey of the year.

Academic goals:

- Reflect on the life of Tie Hacks and Sheepeaters and the valuable lessons we've learned from them
- Explore the impact of white settlers on the lives of Native Americans
- Explore what the Tie Hacks contributed to the development of the west
- Learn ancient mathematical methods, and how they are still used today
- Learn specific astronomy facts and lessons and use what you learned to teach another person

Community Building goals:

- Make a new friend; include/look out for another student; take care of others
- Contribute to a group activity in a positive way
- Say "yes" to promote a positive community environment

Personal Responsibility goals:

- Set up and take down your tent; keep tent area and personal belongings organized
- Turn on stove and cook meal; clean community dishes after a meal
- Pay attention to your surroundings

Students should plan to bring their packed bags with all of their **gear and clothing to school on Tuesday, September 6th**. We will check the gear and load the trailers on Monday afternoon. 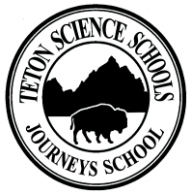

- Banned Book for Language Arts class

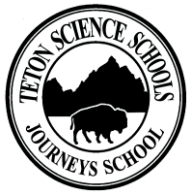
What NOT to bring:

After School Enrichment Program (Grades 3-12)

Course details will be provided at the end of August

- **Description:** The After School Enrichment Program is available to all students enrolled at Journey's School in grades 3-12. If space allows, non-Journey's School students will be allowed to enroll in classes. Specific class information will be available three weeks before each session begins. Some classes will meet once per week, some may meet twice per week.
- **Schedule:**
 - Fall classes will meet for nine weeks, September 19th through the week of November 14th.
 - Winter classes will meet for nine weeks, January 16th through the week of March 19th, with no classes the week of February 20th.
 - Spring classes will meet for six weeks, the week of April 16th through the week of May 21st.
- **Location and Time:** Classes meet in Journey's School classrooms and will be defined with each offering. Classes will meet from 3:30-5:00pm.
- **Faculty:** Varies based on the class – Specific class information will be available three weeks before each session begins.
- **Cost:** Each nine week session will be \$135 for classes that meet once per week / \$270 if two days per week. Six week sessions will be \$90 for classes that meet once per week / \$180 if two days per week. At this time, tuition assistance aid is not available for the enrichment programs. Extra experiences, such as the Robotics tournament, will have extra costs.
- **Registration:** Students will need to sign up for an entire session; drop-in is not available for the After School Enrichment Program. All classes require a minimum of six students and are limited to a maximum of twelve students.
- **To Register:** Registration will be required no less than one week before each session begins. To register, please contact Sam Kitchen at 307.733.3729 or sam.kitchen@journeysschool.org.
